Déjà Vu at Whittier School

at Whittier School



Remember last fall when parents occupied a fieldhouse on the Whittier Dual Language School campus? In September 2010 community members, students and teachers joined the parents to save the building, called La Casita, from demolition. When construction fencing and a dumpster showed up on the Pilsen campus and the make-shift community center and meeting place was marked for destruction, the parents took matters into their own hands--they refused to leave and called on the community to defend the building and to create a library. With collective action, negotiations with the City, massive book donations and support from volunteer librarians, architects and others, a plan was made to keep La Casita and move forward with the library.

At the end of the school year, less than one week after students were released for the summer, June 2011, construction fencing and dumpsters again materialized at the school. Did the City think we wouldn't notice? This time, the City and Chicago Public Schools prepared to demolish a classroom and displace special needs students to build a small library inside the main school building. The parents, teachers, students and community around Whittier have meanwhile raised most of the money needed to rehab La Casita and create a multi-use center and library that is safe, accessible, modern, and a focal point for the neighborhood.

Clearly, CPS leaders don't want to set a precedent for conceding to demands of parents at a school they want to shut down (and maybe ultimately give the campus to the private school moving in next door). The school board and Alderman Solis might also believe, wrongly, that by building the library inside the school they will be making the community center redundant and can then tear down La Casita and build the soccer field that the private school wants.

The second around-the-clock occupa-

tion of the fieldhouse has ended, but this struggle is far from ended: pickets, marches, door-to-door canvassing, and more are needed to take on CPS, Solis, and private interests with their collective sights set on wrecking Whittier. Ready to Get Set, Go!

All of you sci-fi fans out there have probably heard of Octavia E. Butler, an American author who has won both the Hugo and Nebula awards. If you have read *The Parable of the Sower*, the first of the postapocalyptic "Earthseed" series, you may have considered making your own emergency packs a la Lauren Olamina--the teen-aged heroine whose foresight allowed her to escape and survive when her neighborhood was attacked and destroyed.

Your neighborhood will probably not be plundered by drug-crazed adolescents who shave their heads, paint their skin green and blue and indulge in sprees of arson, rape and murder. Probably. Call them what you will--go-bags, emergency packs, bug-out kits--these little numbers could someday save your life, or at least make it easier to make a split second decision to leave town and join forces with workers in a neighboring state. In that spirit, here's a list to get you started:

DIY Bug-Out Kit packing list:

Matches/lighters, flashlight, pocket knife, duct tape, electrical tape
Change of clothes, including shoes
Comb, toothbrush, toothpaste, soap
Towel (in tribute to another dearly departed sci fi writer, Douglas Adams)
Tampons/keeper
Safety pins, needle, thread
Alcohol, bandages, aspirin

Spoons, fork (or save space with a spork)

can opener, lightweight pot
Water bottle (gallon or larger), canteen,
water bottle for carrying around
Dried fruit, nuts

There are millions of other things you can add, as-needed for your specific situations/ general strike/crisis/revolt. Maps are good. Paper, pens, batteries, chargers for various electronics, solar-powered devices, radio, seeds, defense items. You will probably need a cricket bat. You just never know, do you?
